

Campus walk - Faculty of Science and Engineering

In this campus walk you will get the chance to get an impression of our faculty and its buildings by yourself. We created a map for you, which you can find on page six. Feel free to walk around campus and explore where our education takes place!

The campus walk starts at the red dot with the letter 'S' (see legend). At this point you can begin the regular tour through our buildings (black arrows) or you can start off by getting a glimpse of our building Kapteynborg or the Foodcourt (red arrows). This is a small detour of the regular route since you are not allowed to enter the building, only to see it from the outside. Description of the building is found on the bottom of this page.

After the entrance in every building some details are given below about the respective buildings including which programmes will be hosted within the buildings. **One important note** before you start the tour: within the Energy Academy building you are not allowed to take pictures or videos. We'd appreciate it if you stick to this measure.

Let's begin!

1. If you follow the black arrows from the start point you will encounter the entrance of the first building on our route: **Bernoulliborg**.

Bernoulliborg - build in 2008

This building hosts the BSc programmes Computing Science, (Applied) Mathematics, and (partly) Industrial Engineering and Management. The name Bernoulli is a reference to Johan and Daniel Bernoulli, father and son, both mathematicians who studied at the University of Groningen and made important scientific discoveries within the field of mathematics.

2. When you're in the entrance hall of the building, the canteen is to your left. Here you can buy lunch or have a coffee. When you go up the great stairs to your right you'll find some lecture rooms at the end of the hall. On top of the building is also the Blaauw Observatory (visible from the outside).
3. Once you've got a glimpse of the Bernoulliborg we continue our way. Follow the arrows outside and find yourself eventually at the building **Linnaeusborg**.

Linnaeusborg - Build in 2010

This building hosts the BSc programmes Biology and Life Science and Technology. The name Linnaeus refers to Carl Linnaeus who was a botanist and named many organisms. He is known as the father of modern Taxonomy. Fun fact: the form of the building is based on a DNA string, the double helix!

4. Feel free to walk around a bit. You'll find the canteen near the entrance.

5. Once you've got an impression of this building we will continue our way to the back door of the **Energy Academy** where we will walk through.

Energy academy - Build in 2016

This building is the most sustainable educational building in the Netherlands and a cooperation between the University of Applied Sciences, University of Groningen and other partners. The unique design demonstrates how a building can make optimum use of the natural elements earth, water, air and sunlight as a primary source of energy. For example the solar panels on the roof of the building.

6. Feel free to look around. But remember, no pictures or videos are allowed within the building.
7. Once you've made your walk straight through the building we come across the exit and we will continue our way to the last building of this tour: **Nijenborgh**. The entrance of this building is a bit hidden but if you follow the arrows you must be able to find it!

Nijenborgh - Build in 1969

This building hosts the BSc programmes (Applied) Physics, Chemistry, Chemical Engineering and (partly) Industrial Engineering and Management. It's one of the first buildings of The Zernike Campus and therefore somewhat outdated. The existing Nijenborgh 4 must therefore make way for a completely new building: The Feringa Building, named after Nobel Prize in Chemistry laureate Ben Feringa. However, depending on the university's space requirements, parts of Nijenborgh 4 may be preserved.

8. Feel free to have a look around the building. It is a bit of a maze so make sure you know how to find your way back ;)
9. The visiting of this building marks the end of the campus walk. If you have not followed the red arrows yet, feel free to do so to get a glimpse of the **Foodcourt** and the building **Kapteynborg**.

Kapteynborg - Build in 1983

This building hosts The Kapteyn Institute, the name of the Department of Astronomy at the University of Groningen. The Netherlands Institute of Space Research (SRON) is also located within this building. The name 'Kapteynborg' is derived from Jacobus Cornelius Kapteyn, an important Dutch astronomer

Our BSc programmes Biomedical Engineering and Pharmacy are located in the UMCG. Watch the following video to have a look inside:
